EVALUATION SUMMARY

About the attendees

Number of attendees¹: 24 **Number of attendees who completed an evaluation:** 15 (or 63% of group)

- 69% from Ontario, 15% from Western Canada (British Columbia), 15% from Eastern Canada (Nova Scotia)
- 33% were new to *What's Hot with Peer Researchers*
- 100% were involved in research as a peer, a researcher/study team member, or research coordinator

Feedback on the session

Overall satisfaction

- 86% of respondents were satisfied with the session
- 100% of respondents would participate in future sessions of "What's Hot"

Top reasons for attending session

- Respondents wanted to learn from other peer researchers
- Respondents wanted to learn more about research studies that have peer researchers working with them
- Respondents wanted the chance to *share their viewpoint*

Session content

- 71% agreed the questions asked by participants were answered during the session
- 86% agreed the online chat feature was an effective way to create dialogue among participants
- 73% agreed there was enough time for questions

Session outcomes

- 80% agreed the session provided a chance to discuss key issues relevant to *working with peer researchers*
- 94% agreed the session provided an opportunity to discuss key issues *relevant to peer researchers*

Ideas that stood out for participants during this session

- Compensation vs. remuneration. Really interesting distinction!
- Terminology and definitions around PRA
- Differences in opinions amongst peers working in research
